

Andorra Telecom's Universal 100 Mbps Fibre Mandate — From Copper Shutdown to a 10 Gbps National Network

Summary

In 2011 Andorra legislated internet access as a universal service, obliging state monopoly Andorra Telecom to supply at least 100 Mbps fibre to every home at government-set prices; copper lines were fully retired by December 2016 and speeds now reach 10 Gbps.
