Summary

Since 2004, femLINKpacific's Women's Weather Watch connects rural Fijian women via SMS and radio to the Fiji Met Office. By 2016, it engaged 165 groups representing 48,000 women and 99,593 households. WMO recognises it as a gender best practice in disaster risk reduction.
