

Green Dot — Bystander-Training Strategy Against Sexual & Dating Violence, Kentucky High Schools

Summary

A CDC-funded cluster-randomised trial across 26 Kentucky high schools found Green Dot's bystander-training model reduced sexual violence, dating violence and stalking versus control schools, though effects varied by outcome and by student gender.
