Summary

A \$200,000 Coca-Cola Foundation grant funded a 6.6-mile fence protecting 1,400 acres of native Koʻolau forest on Oʻahu from invasive species, safeguarding aquifer recharge for a system supplying over 364 million gallons of drinking water daily.
