

Local Law 35 — New York City's Annual Public Inventory of Municipal Algorithmic Tools

Evidence strength: Moderate

Summary

Under NYC's Local Law 35 (2022), every city agency must publicly report each algorithmic tool it used yearly. The 2023 report counted 46 tools across 14 agencies - six times the 8 recorded a decade earlier - after inconsistent reporting forced clearer definitions.
