

Partnership for Peace: A Court-Based Perpetrator-Intervention Programme in Grenada

Summary

Since 2005, Grenada's courts have diverted male domestic-violence perpetrators into UN Women's 16-week 'Partnership for Peace' programme; a peer-reviewed 2008-2011 evaluation found the model sustained via multi-sectoral partnerships, though recidivism data remain unpublished.
