

TEQSA's National Generative-AI Action-Plan Mandate — Assessment Reform Across Every Australian University

Summary

In July 2024 Australia's regulator required all 203 higher-education providers to submit generative-AI risk action plans. Its 2025 guidance found detecting AI use is “all but impossible” and pushed providers toward assessment redesign, not detection software.
