

Vermont's Statutory AI Inventory — 16 Tools Disclosed, Only 2 Bias-Tested

Summary

A 2022 law requires Vermont's Agency of Digital Services to inventory every automated decision system state government uses. Its 2024 report logged 16 AI tools across agencies, but found only 2 had been tested for bias — showing the gap between disclosure and assurance.
